Program

WHO SHOULD ATTEND

Administrators, disaster planning coordinators, emergency department nurses, emergency department physicians, engineers, safety officers, and other personnel who are responsible for emergency preparedness in hospitals.

PROGRAM PURPOSE

This program will provide participants with information that will assist them with facility and area wide disaster planning; and provide a forum for experts in various types of disaster situations to address the current issues that confront health care facilities in the area of emergency preparedness. Special emphasis will be placed on implementation of a hospital disaster plan that recognizes the hospital's special capabilities.

CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDITS

Motivations for Disaster Planning

This session will enumerate the reasons for disaster planning in hospitals, describe the team approach to disaster planning, and instruct participants on how to motivate the members of the emergency preparedness team and their respective hospital departments.

The Planning Process

Topics to be discussed in this session include: identification of community resources, assessment of potential disaster sites, determining a lead agency, and fostering interagency cooperation. Special emphasis will be placed on developing an ongoing working relationship among hospitals; police, fire, and transportation sources; and municipal, county, and state agencies.

Disaster Site Management

Notification of disaster, the need for command posts, staffing of command posts, handling the public and the press, medical response, and communications are among the topics that will be presented in this session. Transportation and triage also will be discussed.

Emergency Preparedness and the Emergency Medical Services System

Emergency medical care of the casualties crosses many lines of authority and moves from one component to another in the emergency medical services system. This session will address the necessary linkages that must be established to assure preparedness for mass casualties and their treatments.

Internal Disasters

The hospital's role and responsibilities in preparation for internal disasters, such as fire, bomb threats, or loss of utilities services, will be presented in this session.

JCAH Standards

A spokesperson for the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals (JCAH) will review and interpret the standards necessary for hospital accreditation.

Common deficiencies cited by JCAH surveyors and possible solutions will be reviewed.

Disaster Drills

Types of possible disaster drills, such as full scale, modified, and command post exercise will be illustrated during this session. The need for conducting drills as well as tips for motivating various community organizations' and agencies' involvement in the drills will be discussed.

Strategic Planning for Various Types of Disasters

The need for special disaster protocols will be focused on in this session. Nuclear accidents, toxic-chemical (hazardous materials), severe weather, civil disturbances, and seismic (earthquake) disasters are types of disasters that will be discussed.

Transportation and Communications

The two essential support systems for effective disaster and emergency preparedness planning—transportation and communications—will be addressed in this session. Panelists from the federal government and private sector will present these topics from their viewpoints and will discuss how these systems need to be integrated into total area wide disaster plans.

Who's in Charge

This panel discussion of the topic of who's in charge of the disaster site will define the roles of the fire service, police, and the medical team from the perspectives of the agencies and the medical community.

Dear

The recent incident at Three Mile Island brought to light not only the possibility of nuclear disasters, but the fact that there had been little recent concern or planning for such disasters. At one point plans were initiated to evacuate patients from Pennsylvania to Maryland. Fortunately, there were no mass casualties that had been exposed to radioactivity and evacuation was not necessary. From the questions we received and the questions we ourselves had, it is clear that emergency medical personnel have not received sufficient information and training about radiation emergencies and that emergency plans need updating.

In order to provide this training we have assembled a group of speakers for a two-day workshop at the International Inn at BWI Airport on 3-4 October 1979. The program for the workshop is enclosed.

The workshop is primarily intended for emergency medical personnel in the State of Maryland. We believe every hospital in Maryland should be represented at this conference and we will give first priority to your registrants. In order to defray expenses at the workshop, we will have to charge a registration fee of \$20 per participant. This fee will include lunch on Wednesday and coffee breaks for both days. Continuing education credits are being sought for physicians and nurses.

In order that we can complete our plans, please return the enclosed registration form by 15 August 1979. Cancellations with full refund will be honored until 24 September.
