11 Senator Rosalie Abrams

16 Senator Abrams was recognized
17 for her long-time support and
18 sponsorship of EMS legislation
19 in Maryland. She recently
20 sponsored SB 397 which

23 and adjoining states to

25 patients across state lines.

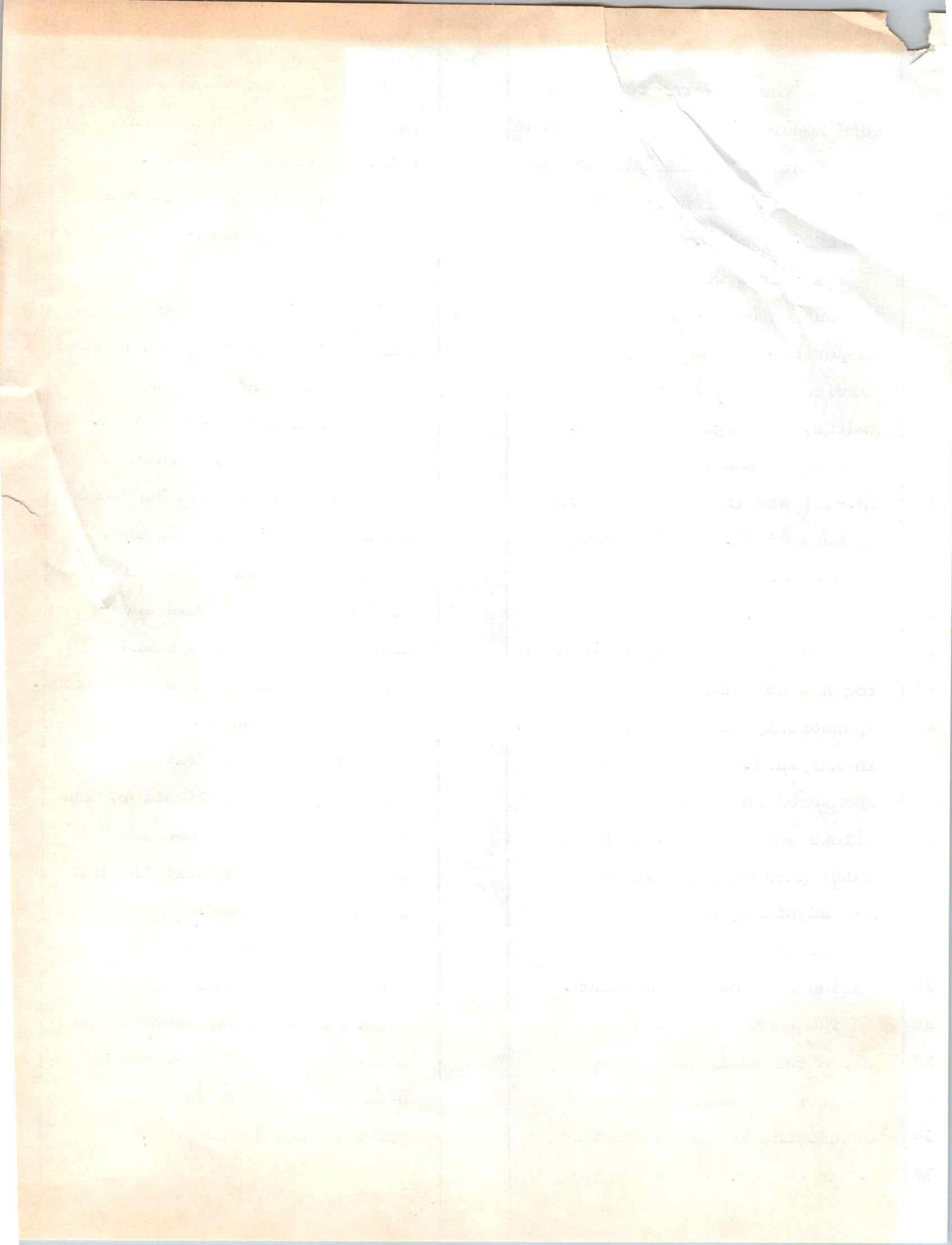
26 The commissioners were

Agency Award by the Maryland
Council of Fire and Rescue
Academies. Mrs. Rowe was

MIEMSS.

Frank Barranco, MD was honored

center.
