



ArAre you waware that more Americans under the age of 40 will die this year as a result of traumatic injury than will die of cancer and heart disease?

Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Providers in the state of Maryland are committed to reducing these statistics. They are succeeding. As a result of these efforts over 95% of Maryland's trauma victims survive.

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





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Governor Harry Hughes has proclaimed September 12-19 as Emergency Medical Services Week. More than 20 area residents
were honored for their exceptional
contributions to EMS in Maryland
at a special ceremony during
the EMS Olympics.

The awards were presented
in four categories: EMS
Supporters of the Year, Special
Service Awards, EMS Agency
Awards, and Regional Awards.

Senator Rosalie Abrams
(D.-42) and the county commissioners of St. Mary's County
were honored as EMS Supporters
of the Year.

Senator Abrams was recognized for her long-time support and sponsorship of EMS legislation in Maryland. She recently sponsored SB 397 which allows advanced life support (ALS) personnel in Maryland and adjoining states to render care and transport patients across state lines.

The commissioners were cited for their unanimous support and assistance in organizing an ALS program in their county.

Special Service Awards were presented to six outstanding EMS supporters this year.

William Kenny, an Allegany
County commissioner, was
credited with spearheading the
placement of a Med-Evac
helicopter in Region I, and with
implementing the Allegany
County Fire and Rescue Board.

Committee for EMT Training,


Testing, and Certification, and

Their actions were credited with saving lives and calming the fears of those involved in the incident.

EMS Agency Awards were presented to individuals selected by their associations for excellence in service. The Maryland State
Police cited Corporal William

V council member, and his commitment to providing high quality medical care to the critically ill.

Leona Rowe, member of the

Laurel Rescue Squad and instructor
at MFRI, was chosen for an

Academies. Mrs. Rowe was

credited with spending countless

hours teaching and tutoring

students, often donating her

time to instructing. In addition,

Turnbull was instrumental in setting

up 911 in Allegany County and

getting a helicopter for Region I.

John R. Marsh, MD, a private surgeon, has played a major role in the development of the Mid-Maryland EMS Advisory Council, and has served as its president twice in the past eight years. His leadership has enabled Washington County Hospital to develop as a major part of the EMS network, and to become recognized as an areawide trauma center.

The Region III recipient,

Joseph I. Berman, MD, became active in the EMS program in 1975 when he was chosen chairman of Emergency Services Development,

Inc., responsible for coordinating the Baltimore Metropolitan area EMS communications system. His personal commitment to improving the delivery of EMS became an extension of his responsibility as an assistant secretary for the State Department of Health and Mental Hygiene.

George M. Walker, Jr., member of the Community Fire Company in

Rising Sun, was presented with the Region IV award. He was honored for his dedicated volunteer service, especially in the prehospital phase of EMS and as a Region IV EMS council member. The Region V award was presented to J. Patrick Jarboe, MD, in recognition of his outstanding support of the advanced life support program in St. Mary's County. He was specifically cited for uniting all the forces necessary to successfully implement the program.
