

# Maryland's Elvis Olympics Sunday, September 18th

at the Baltimore County Campus of the University of Maryland (UMBC)

The 1983 EMS Olympics kicks off this year's EMS week celebration, September 18-24. During this special week, Marylanders honor the more than 50,000 volunteer and career emergency health professionals who provide both prehospital and hospital emergency care to trauma victims.

Today's Olympics focuses on prehospital care providers. Years ago, no formal medical training was available to the persons who took care of emergency patients in the field. All that was required was a desire to help one's fellow man. That desire has not changed, but to it have been added the skills that are necessary to make a difference in patient outcome. Today, the State of Maryland recognizes five categories of prehospital care providers, who receive 80 to 380 hours of training. This training prepares them to perform many advanced emergency procedures, such as heart defibrillation and the intravenous administration of medications. Because prehospital care providers have made it possible to start effective treatment before the patient reaches the hospital, patient survival has improved remarkably.

Watch these dedicated rescuers as they demonstrate their life-saving skills in a competition that will last throughout the afternoon. Teams of three pre-hospital care providers, representing various fire and rescue companies around the state, will be asked to handle two different emergency situations. The teams will be judged on the appropriateness of the care they render. This year, for the first time, the teams will compete on two levels of expertise - basic life support and advanced life support - and awards will be presented to the best three teams on each level.

# After medical missions, state copters fly for public relations

When State Police helicopter crews aren't flying accident victims to shock-trauma centers or training ambulance medics in Med-Evac techniques, they work at public relations.

Some examples:

• When Gov. Harry R. Hughes gave a college commencement speech at St. Mary's College in May, he flew there from Annapolis in a State Police helicopter. Hughes averages one such flight a month. The flights are called, officially, "VIP transports."

- Glen Tosten, of the Millington Volunteer Fire Department in Kent County, asked State Police to display a Med-Evac helicopter at a "volly" carnival last spring. State Police sent one. The carnival was a huge success.
- The State Highway Administration asked the State Police to send a "Huey," the squadron's largest helicopter, to lift soil-testing equipment inland from a highway near Vienna, on the Eastern Shore, this summer. The chopper's two days of work saved the SHA a week of slow, costly overland maneuvering on soft ground.

# People You Can Count On

PARAMEDICS COMPETE IN EMS OLYMPICS

The high rise evacuation team (HEAT) was part of the third annual Emergency Medical Services Olympics, sponsored by MIEMSS and the Emergency Health Services Program at UMBC Sept. 18.

Spectators also saw a Red Cross demonstration of "drownproofing" — ways to save someone without getting into the water yourself. The Earleigh Heights Volunteer Fire Company's rescue squad, armed with huge power clippers and winches, showed the safest way to free an accident victim from a wrecked car. In the spirit of the occasion, just as the car roof rolled back like the lid of a giant sardine can, the-crowd had to move aside so that Paramedic Unit 5 could respond to a real emergency.

The U.S. Army was there too, with two segments of an inflatable field hospital that in a combat situation would fill a football field. The 250 to 400 bed hospital, with two to six operating rooms, is powered by two gas turbine generators. Parkville's Army Reserve National Guard 136th Combat Support Hospital is one of only two units of its type on the East Coast.

The highlight of the EMS Olympics was the skills competition, in which the men and women on whom most Marylanders depend for prehospital emergency medical care vie for some \$4,500 in prize money. Each three-person team had 20 minutes to stabilize the victims in a mock emergency. The patients—meticulously moulaged with bruises, protruding bones and bloody gashes—were played by UMBC students.

In all, 16 teams competed this year in two categories. First prize in the advanced life support competition went to the Frederick County ALS team, an all-volunteer crew that is relatively new to ALS services. Teams from the Laurel Volunteer Rescue Squad won both first and second place in the basic life support category. The prize money will be used to buy equipment for their companies.

The Olympics kick off a whole week of events aimed at increasing public awareness of Maryland's 50,000 emergency medical care providers. The theme this year is "People You Can Count On." And indeed we do.

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# Emergency crews vie in life-saving skills

A warehouse worker loses control of his forklift, running into another man before he hits a stack of auto parts and knocks it over on top of himself.

The emergency medical technicians arrive and what they do within the next few minutes will determine whether those two warehouse workers live or die:

That was one of the mock situations confronting more than a dozen rescue teams from around the state who gathered yesterday at the University of Maryland at Baltimore County for the Third Annual Maryland Emergency Medical Service. Olympics.

How well those teams responded to the different emergencies determined how well they did in the competition.

The 15 teams that assembled at UMBC to compete already had survived eliminations held around the state. At stake was not only pride inbeing declared the best emergency team in the state, but a \$1,000 prize in each of two categories to take back to their ambulance companies to buynew equipment.

The two levels of competition were: Basic Life Support for those technicians who had trained about 100 hours and were schooled in basic first aid, and Advanced Life Support for those who had trained almost 400 hours in everything from restarting hearts with electric shocks to administering medicine intravenously.

When it was all over yesterday, the Frederick County Volunteer Fire Company won first place in the Advanced Life Support team competition, with the Baltimore City Fire Department finishing second and the Baltimore County Fire Department third.

In the Basic Life Support category, teams from the Laurel Volunteer Rescue Squad took first and second places, with the Woodlawn Volunteers finishing third.

"Statewide, we have over 12.000 emergency medical technicians, and about 1,000 of them are cardiac resuscitation technicians," said Dr. Alasdair Conn, director of field operations for the Maryland Institute of Emergency Medical Service Systems (MIEMSS).

Maryland has proclaimed itself the most advanced state in the coun-

try in emergency medical services, primarily because of the way the services are coordinated, Dr. Conn said.

"In other areas, you may have a very good paramedic squad, in say Dallas, but you go 15 miles and you have nothing," he said. In Maryland, emergency teams are trained throughout the state, they know one another, and the yearly competition gives the teams an added incentive to keep their skills sharp, he said.

Inside the UMBC field house yesterday, students from the college's emergency health services program and doctors from MIEMSS staged different problems for the three-person rescue teams.

The teams were kept isolated until they were ready to compete. Then they were brought into the rings, told the situation and given 20 minutes to stabilize their patients and get themready to take to a hospital.

Some teams worked on people who were smeared with fake blood and made up to appear injured. Other teams worked on plastic dummies to demonstrate mouth-to-mouth resuscitation and heart massage techniques.

Each team was watched closely by judges who scored them on what they did right — and what they did wrong.

While the teams competed inside the gym, outside State Police and Baltimore county firemen demonstrated some of their more dramatic rescue techniques.

A State Police helicopter lifted a fire-fighting team to the top of the five-story science building and picked up some building residents, as the chopper would do if the building were on fire and residents stranded on the roof.

Once atop the building the firemen rappelled down the side like mountain climbers, swung into a third-floor window, picked up a "stranded" person and took him to the ground.

In the quadrangle at the campus center, other fire companies from around the state had their rescue and medical equipment on display for the hundreds who attended yesterday's

The event gave volunteers and professionals a chance to visit with old friends and a chance to make some new ones, Dr. Conn said, After all, he said, the firemen, the medical technicians and the policemen are all in the same business — helping people and saving lives.
