Awarded to members of the EMS or public safety services who, in the course of providing emergency medical services or rescue operations, intelligently perform acts of extraordinary heroism or bravery in the direct provision of emergency medical care in the saving or attempted saving of the lives of others.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

Awarded to members of the EMS community who render services of unusual intelligence, alertness, or skill that result in the solution of an emergency medical service problem, initiation of injury or illness prevention measures, or resolution of an administrative problem.

On October 22, 1991, Trooper First Class Barber checked a vehicle that had stopped on Interstate 68 near Cumberland. The driver of the car told Trooper Barber that a passenger, Jennings Rosier, was having difficulty breathing and chest pains. While the trooper was summoning an ambulance, Mr. Rosier stopped breathing. Trooper Barber returned to the car, found that the man had no pulse or respiration, and began CPR. The victim responded but then lost consciousness again. Trooper Barber initiated CPR a second time and revived Mr. Rosier. Shortly thereafter, an ambulance crew from Flintstone Volunteer Fire Company arrived at the scene and then transported the patient, who was conscious and responsive, to Memorial Hospital in Cumberland.

Trooper Barber correctly identified the symptoms of a cardiac arrest and performed life-saving CPR. This Certificate of Honor is presented in recognition of his skill and quick action.

Mr. Ager's commitment to training the public in CPR, and his demonstrated ability to do so, make him a deserving recipient of this Distinguished Service Award.

Five-year old Aaron Kelly was home with his mother on the evening of February 18, 1992. His mother, Mrs. Mizah, who was 4 months pregnant, experienced a sharp abdominal pain while standing at the top of a stairway. She doubled over, fell head first down the flight of stairs, and was knocked unconscious. Aaron witnessed the fall and tried to arouse his mother. When she did not respond to him, Aaron dialed 9-1-1, which brought a response from the Funkstown Volunteer Fire Department and the Community Rescue Service in Hagerstown. Mrs. Mizah was transported to Washington County Hospital, where she was treated and released.

For thinking quickly during his mother's emergency and for taking action to get medical help, we award this civilian certificate of honor to Aaron Kelly.

On May 25, 1991, Sergeant Denise Fox, a paramedic, was dispatched with Medic 49 to a car crash. A station wagon had hit a pole and slid over an embankment, trapping three teenagers inside. The driver of the car was dead and pinned in the vehicle. Victoria Popdan was unconscious in the front passenger seat. When she was extricated, she was in shock, with agonal respirations and a compromised airway. Sergeant Fox and her crew immobilized Ms. Popdan, secured her airway, and stabilized her before she was flown to Suburban Hospital. At the trauma center, it was determined that Ms. Popdan had sustained a fracture of her cervical spine.

Sergeant Fox visited Ms. Popdan during her hospitalization. A friendship developed between them, which continued during Victoria's stay at David Rehabilitation Hospital in Denver. Victoria has since returned home as a quadriplegicconfined to a wheelchair; Sergeant Fox visits frequently and takes her shopping and to the movies.

Ms. Popdan's recovery and rehabilitation have been emotionally draining for her and her family. During many of the [Page 1 of 2]

difficult times, Sergeant Fox was there to comfort and motivate Victoria. They feel that their friendship has been a significant influence on Victoria's progress in her rehabilitation.

Sergeant Fox is a conscientious paramedic and a dedicated EMT instructor. She always demonstrates concern for patients by providing the best care possible. For her compassion, sensitivity, and dedication to excellence in prehospital care, we present this Distinguished Service Award to Sergeant Denise Fox.

On the way to the station, they saw the crash -- an overturned vehicle lying in a pool of gasoline. discovered a man trapped in the vehicle, his head pinned between the dashboard and roof. The dashboard was compressing the victim's airway, and he was bleeding profusely from the mouth and nose. EMT Hassler stabilized the man's cervical spine and started to work his head away from the dashboard. The two responders then used their own strength to spread apart the dashboard and the roof, which opened the victim's airway. Other members of the St. Leonard Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department arrived on the scene, stabilized the vehicle, and extricated the victim. The man was transported to Calvert Memorial Hospital and then to Med-Star in Washington.

We present these Certificates of Honor to Patrick Hassler and Michael Sharpe for their bravery, ingenuity, and effective medical care, which saved the life of the man trapped in the car.

Region II

Distinguished Service Award

to

Frederick County Advanced Life Support Program

The Frederick County Advanced Life Support Program was initiated in 1982 through funds provided by a federal grant and support from the local county government. The original program was staffed by volunteer ALS providers and managed by a part-time paid coordinator. During the first year of operation, the ALS program responded to more than 1100 calls, providing more than 14,000 hours of voluntary service.

Now, a decade later, the program has a full-time paid coordinator and still relies on an all-volunteer force. Sixty-seven CRTs and EMT-Ps provide 24-hour coverage to Frederick County. The hub of the operation remains in Frederick City, where most of the calls originate. Satellite "chase cars" are stationed in the northern part of the county, near Thurmont, and in the south, in Jefferson.

In 1991, the Frederick County ALS Program responded to 3,938 calls, involving almost 29,000 hours of service. Sixteen of the current volunteers were on the original roster, 10 years ago. ALS program members each agree to provide a minimum of 36 hours of service every month to maintain their membership.

For your decade of service to the residents of Frederick County, we present this Distinguished Service Award to the Frederick County ALS Program.

On September 5, 1991, Prince Georges 5 responded to a call in which a woman had crashed her car head-on into a tree. When they arrived, James Shields and Patricia Powell, both firefighters and paramedics, found the patient to be confused, with mild trouble breathing and low blood pressure. They requested a med-evac helicopter and began advanced life support. Following inflation of the MAST Suit, the patient's blood pressure rose but then dropped rapidly as her breathing became extremely labored. The paramedics assessed that the woman was experiencing tension pneumothorax (a build-up of pressure in the chest) and relayed that information to Trooper First Class Charles Eisele aboard the responding Maryland State Police Helicopter Trooper 2. Paramedic Eisele was participating in a pilot study of the treatment of tension pneumothorax, and upon arrival confirmed the findings of Paramedics Shields and Powell.

The patient was conscious but had no obtainable blood pressure and was in severe respiratory distress. She had no breath sounds on the right side, her trachea was pushed to the

left, and her upper body was blue. Authorization was given by the receiving physician at Prince Georges Hospital Trauma Center for Paramedic Eisele to insert a catheter into the patient's chest to relieve the pressure. With placement of the catheter, a large volume of air exited the chest, and the patient's breathing improved immediately. Her blood pressure, trachea position, and skin color returned to normal. The patient was flown to PG Hospital, where she was further stabilized and then taken to an operating room for repair of her severe injuries.

For their roles in saving the life of this patient and for exemplifying outstanding performance within Maryland's system of emergency medical care, Paramedics Shields, Powell, and Eisele are presented with these Certificates of Honor.

The emergency medical team worked for 4 hours to free the man. Dr. Ameen Ramzy was called to the scene, and he and Mr. Pavero tended to the victim's medical needs while the other rescuers extricated him. The man was flown to the MIEMSS Shock Trauma Center and survived.

Prince George's County Fire Department

A report of a personal injury accident was received by the PG County Fire Department on May 3, 1991. Dispatched were Engine 461, Rescue Squad 20, Ambulance 59, and Medic unit 10 from Landover Hills. A dump truck had turned on its side and onto the top of a car. The load of dirt from the truck bed had spilled over the car, leaving only a 1-foot by 4-foot area exposed on the passenger side.

The roof of the car was crushed to the seats. Rescue personnel could see the top of a person's head and her right arm. The entrapped woman could hear the rescuers but could respond only with hand signals. A second rescue squad was requested as well as a tow truck and a backhoe. Emergency personnel also placed a line to protect the victim and themselves from leaking diesel fuel. They began removing the dirt with shovels.

A second victim had crawled from the vehicle before the emergency units arrived. As she was being treated, she told the rescuers that another woman and 3-year-old child were in the car.

After the dirt was removed, the dump truck was lifted and stabilized, and the car was pulled from under the truck with the backhoe. Then the roof and doors of the car were removed and the woman and child rescued. Both appeared to have surprisingly minor injuries but were transported to trauma facilities for complete assessments.

This well-coordinated rescue was conducted safely and had a successful outcome. For their roles in resolving this complex emergency, we are pleased to recognize

Vinson S. Dieterich, EMT-A

Engine #5 from the Hagerstown Fire Department and the Community Rescue Service were dispatched to the scene of a pedestrian struck by a train on August 7, 1991. EMT Vinson Dieterich, the driver of the fire engine, was with the first crew on the scene. The incident occurred on a remote section of railroad tracks separated from the road by a high barbed-wire fence. Mr. Dieterich ran along the tracks and found the victim under an engine, wedged between the tracks, with both legs severed above the knees. After checking with railroad personnel to ensure that the train would not move, Mr. Dieterich crawled 40 feet under the locomotive to the victim and pulled him out by crawling backward. The man was bleeding profusely, so EMT Dieterich started an IV and applied direct pressure to the man's femoral arteries for more than 30 minutes, until other emergency care providers could gain access to the site. The victim was taken by ambulance to Washington County Hospital and then transferred to the MIEMSS Shock Trauma Center.

Richard Alcorta, MD, FACEP

Dr. Richard Alcorta has been an emergency physician and paramedic liaison at Suburban Hospital since 1987. Appointed to the Region V EMS Advisory Council in 1988, he has served as its chair for the past 2 years. A dedicated member of the EMS team, Rick has contributed to system development in the areas of education, prevention, advocacy, and coordination.

As an educator, Rick has given hundreds of hours of training in CRT, EMT-P, and continuing education programs in Montgomery County. He has participated in the planning and presentation of conferences in Region V and has spoken at other conferences around the state.

Dr. Alcorta is active at the county, regional, and state levels in accident prevention. He lobbied effectively for passage of Montgomery County's bicycle helmet law and is active with the Safe Kid's Coalition. With a Montgomery County paramedic, Rick presents a program on safe driving to high school students. Using slides of accidents and their victims, this program encourages young drivers to wear seatbelts and to not drink and drive. Since 1987, Rick was a leader in the statewide effort to reinstate

Maryland's motorcycle helmet law. This lifesaving legislation was passed by the General Assembly in 1992.

Rick also has been a member of various groups that coordinate emergency medical services, such as the Montgomery County EMS

Advisory Council and the EMS Committees of the American College of Emergency Physicians and the Board of Physician Quality Assurance.

As chair of the Region V EMS Advisory Council, Rick has been a leader in the effort to restore full funding to MIEMSS and the Maryland State Police Aviation Division.

We are proud to honor and thank Dr. Alcorta for his substantial contributions to injury prevention, public education, training of prehospital care providers, and legislative initiatives. W. Newton Carey, Jr., EMT-P

W. Newton Carey was the paramedic on an EMS crew dispatched to a car fire on November 7, 1991. Actually, two cars were on fire, with one victim trapped inside. The first car was upright, fully engulfed in flames. The second was on its passenger side in a deep ditch, and the engine was beginning to burn. Paramedic Carey was told that a woman was in the second car. He climbed down into the ditch but couldn't see the woman through the thick smoke. Fire was spreading from the engine toward the passenger compartment.

Paramedic Carey managed to open the car door and find the victim, who was still in her seatbelt and shoulder strap. He cut the straps and pulled the woman toward him. Suddenly, the pressure of the door, which he had been holding open with his back and shoulder, was relieved. It had been opened by Cpl. Darby McCready and the victim's nephew.

Then the car's engine exploded, and so did the other car.

Because the people holding the door were startled, they lost their grip and the door fell onto Paramedic Carey. But they regained their composure and picked up the door again. The woman was finally pulled from the car and into a nearby field.

Paramedic Carey assessed the patient and found spontaneous respirations and a strong carotid pulse. She had a facial injury, a fractured left arm, and a compound fracture of the lower left leg. She also appeared to have a flail chest and a developing hemopneumothorax.

As stabilization procedures progressed, a med-evac helicopter, Trooper 4, arrived. Paramedic Carey accompanied the woman during the flight to Peninsula Regional Medical Center.

At great personal danger and in an act of remarkable and exemplary bravery, Paramedic Carey rescued a gravely injured woman from a burning car. For his heroism and concern for his fellow humans, we are pleased to present this Certificate of Honor.

Baltimore County Fire Department

A Certificate of Honor is being awarded to the Baltimore County Fire Department for the successful rescue of J. David Kates, who was buried in a trench cave-in. The incident occurred on the morning of November 7, 1991, in Essex. Dispatched to the scene were Units E6, T15, S262, ATR, Engine 55, Cave-in 55, M15, EMS 3, and BC 4. When the responders arrived, they found that a 10- by 4-foot trench, about 6 feet deep, had collapsed and buried Mr. ates. All that the responders could see of Mr. Kates were his left hand and some hair on his head.

The subsequent 8-hour rescue was aggressive yet orderly. In addition to numerous personnel from the Baltimore County Fire Department, individuals from MOSHA, the Montgomery County Fire-Rescue Service, the Baltimore County Bureau of Utilities, C&P, and the Francis Scott Key Medical Center participated in this effort. The innovative tactics used by the rescuers, and their effective cooperation, led to the safe and successful extrication of Mr. Kates. He was transported to the Shock Trauma Center for treatment of his injuries.

For their teamwork and professionalism, and for proving that rescues from cave-in burials are possible, MIEMSS is proud to present this Certificate of Honor to the Baltimore County Fire Department.
