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CITY OF BALTIMORE TO ADD TRAINING IN NEW PROCEDURE FOR EMERGENCY MEDICAL PERSONNEL

Kaiser Permanente Donates Emergency Equipment

(Baltimore, MD...March 4) At a news conference here today, Baltimore Mayor Kurt L. Schmoke and Fire Chief Herman Williams, Jr., announced that Baltimore city emergency medical personnel will receive the training and equipment necessary to advance toward Emergency Medical Technician-Paramedic (EMT-P) status. The training will be offered in modules, beginning with a procedure called endotracheal intubation. Intubation equipment and mannequins to train and supply all city medical units are being donated by the Kaiser Permanente Medical Care Program. The Maryland Institute of Emergency Medical Services Systems (MIEMSS) will design and conduct the training. Baltimore Gas & Electric Company has provided a portion of the funds needed for training.

"This is a milestone in the delivery of emergency medical care to the citizens of Baltimore," "Beginning with this training in endotracheal intubation, our declared Mayor Schmoke. personnel will take their place among the elite in emergency medical care. We are delighted that our partners in the private sector are working with us to remove the barriers to such care for those who live, work, and visit in Baltimore."

"The number one priority of all medical teaching and practice is optimal management of the airway," added Dr. Richard Alcorta, Acting State EMS Director for MIEMSS. "We expect that hundreds of lives a year will be saved in Baltimore because of this project."


"As a direct provider of medical care, Kaiser Permanente is well aware of the importance of intubation for patients. When we first spoke to the University of Maryland at Baltimore about donating the equipment, we were delighted to learn that Mayor Schmoke and the Fire Department were already seeking ways to implement such a program in Baltimore," said Alan J. Silverstone, Senior Vice President and Regional Manager of the non-profit Kaiser Permanente. "We are determined that the citizens of Baltimore receive the finest care possible, whether in our medical centers or from the paramedics who respond to their emergencies."

Silverstone also encouraged other area businesses to support the project with the additional funding still needed to pay for training time for city personnel. "Out of concern for their employees and customers, Baltimore Gas & Electric Company has been very generous with their donation of training funds. We hope that other employers in Baltimore will respond as willingly."

"We look forward to getting this project off and running," said Chief Williams. "Nearly fifty of our 162 medic personnel have sought intubation training on their own. With this new equipment, some of them can begin providing this critical procedure right away, and all of our other medical staff will soon be trained as well."

The equipment donated by Kaiser Permanente will be used in the city's 18 advanced life support units with eight additional airway kits for replacement and training. The total value of the 26 kits and four training mannequins is about \$26,000. Baltimore Gas & Electric Company has provided \$5,000 of the \$26,000 needed for training city personnel. The University of Maryland at Baltimore is providing instructors and laboratories for the project through the Maryland Institute of Emergency Medical Services Systems.

Started in 1927 with six units and twenty fire fighters, the demands placed on the Baltimore City Fire Department's ambulance service have changed dramatically over the decades. The ambulance service currently responds to 105,00 calls per year. To keep pace with this demand, staffing has increased to one hundred sixty-two members on eighteen medic units.

During its growth, the ambulance service evolved from a transport service to a pre-hospital care system, utilizing far more sophisticated medical and technical Today, advanced life support medic units procedures. are equipped with telemetry systems (radio communication systems tied into emergency rooms), defibrillators (used for cardiac arrest), intravenous medications, etc.

Rapid changes in emergency pre-hospital care and operating practices continue to improve on emergency The Baltimore City Fire Department medical services. is committed to expend the necessary energies to keep pace with these changes to deliver the best possible care to the citizens of Baltimore.

KAISER PERMANENTE MEDICAL CARE PROGRAM National Perspective

The Kaiser Permanente Medical Care Program is a nonprofit prepaid group practice health plan providing medical care to 6.6 million members nationwide, or one out of every 36 people across the country. It is the largest private provider of health care in the U.S.

Background

Founded in the 1930s by the well known industrialist Henry J. Kaiser and Sidney R. Garfield, M.D., Kaiser Permanente was established as an alternative to "fee-for-service" medical care for the wartime workers of Kaiser Industries. Today Kaiser Permanente is a national group model health maintenance organization (HMO). It is the largest and most experienced health care delivery system of its kind in the world.

Size and Growth

*The Program opened for enrollment to the community (outside Kaiser Industries) in 1945, at which time membership was 26,000.

*The 12 regions are: Mid-Atlantic States (Maryland/Virginia/Washington, DC), Northern California, Southern California, Northwest (Oregon/Washington state), Hawaii, Colorado, Texas, Ohio, Northeast (Connecticut/Massachussetts/New York), North Carolina, Georgia, and Kansas/Missouri.

- *Over 8,000 physicians and nearly 70,000 employees are affiliated with the Program nationwide.
- *There are 31 hospitals, with more than 7,000 licensed hospital beds, and over 200 medical office locations for outpatient services.
- *More than 30,000 employers offer Kaiser Permanente as a health care choice to their employees.

Organizational Data

- *A not-for-profit, federally qualified health maintenance organization.
- *Management is structured as a partnership between the business managers of the Kaiser Foundation Health Plan and the physicians of the Permanente Medical Groups. The partnership is co-equal.
- *Medical care is provided by Permanente physicians practicing in the Kaiser Permanente medical offices. Inpatient medical care is provided in some regions through Kaiser Permanente hospitals, and in others through selected community hospitals.
